## Chair's report

I am particularly pleased that, as community development policy becomes clearer, the Forum's contribution becomes more evident.

There is great cause for satisfaction about the year's achievements and much work is being put in place for future years' reporting. The active contribution of the co-ordinating committee and all Forum members is vital to its continuing work.

## Who we are and what we do

## Director's report

The past year has proved to be one where the profile of the community and voluntary sectors has increased by the month. Government policy directed at the sectors, and recognition by regional bodies and local agencies of the value of the sectors' contribution, continues to grow. The year has witnessed the sectors becoming more integrated into the planning and development of policy, strategy and service delivery. However, there remains an incredible amount of work to do, in translating policy into action. But let us look at what we have influenced and changed over this last year:

- now co-ordinating European Funding Services for the sectors across the region
- working with the Prison and Probation Services, where we are engaged in preparing a regional resettlement strategy
- putting in place electronic communication networks for communities of interest, such as Neighbourhood Renewal, and the Learning Network
- working with locally-based community and voluntary sector organisations, who will become accountable funding bodies supporting community networks
- linking the sub-regional learning and skills consortia, and communicating what each is achieving
- contributing to the regional agenda through the Regional Chamber, Yorkshire Forward and Government Office.
- supporting the development of the BME network, including appointment of a regional development worker
- publication of data on the sectors' contribution to the regional economy,

and a study of parents and learning opportunities in the region

We have by no means achieved all we want to see happening, but are continuing to profile community engagement and voluntary sector delivery. We are demonstrating the sectors' contribution to the regional economy and the delivery of skills development. We are part of a wider process of disseminating the value of community capacity building, which has led to increased engagement, local solutions and improved service delivery. We are also working with Yorkshire Forward on proposals to address the issue of 'connecting communities with economic opportunities', which we believe will strengthen the sectors' ability to take on a greater role in regeneration.

This time next year we hope to be reporting back on how much has been achieved over the coming year. In particular, how the sectors have made an even greater impact on behalf of local people and on the policies and decisions that affect all our lives.

This review gives a real sense of what we have done during the past year. But if you want to know more, or question how we have approached issues, or throw out challenges, please do contact me - we want to ensure that we continue to work on behalf of our members in the voluntary and community sectors, and with our regional partners.

## Achievements 2000 — 2001

### Forum work plan progresses

Activities during the past year have built on the strategic plan agreed in February 2000. This specifies the role and remit of the Forum, and the tasks and responsibilities of staff and co-ordinating committee. It also identifies the need to establish a distinct identity; and lists priorities for action and provides a pro-active work plan. This year the plan has been further developed at an Away-Day for the committee and staff held in Bradford in July 2001 and through subsequent discussion.

### Conference programme

A programme of conferences and consultations on a variety of topics and involving various partners was successfully delivered during the year. Details are provided under the appropriate section elsewhere in this report.

### Active Partners: benchmarking community participation

The Regional Forum has participated in the development of *Active Partners: benchmarking community participation* – an innovative toolkit designed to measure the participation of communities in regeneration programmes, since its conception. *Active Partners* provides a framework for putting community involvement at the heart of any economic regeneration scheme and demands a cultural shift in the approach to regeneration by all stakeholders.

Originally commissioned by Yorkshire Forward to measure the progress and impact of the Single Regeneration Budget, *Active Partners* is being piloted in this and other regions, and is having a national impact on approaches to community participation. A conference on

the subject was held in November 2000, jointly with the Churches Regional Commission. Further conferences to evaluate communities and schemes are planned for November and December 2001 in conjunction with COGS, the consultants responsible for *Active Partners*.

### European Funding Services

The Regional Forum assumed responsibility for strategic issues connected with EU funding, following the demise of VONEF in December 2000, with training and advice services provided by the Forum's sub-regional partners: Charities Information Bureau (for W. Yorkshire), N. Yorkshire Forum for Voluntary Organisations (for N. Yorkshire); and Humber Community Partnership (for the Humber). A review of current provision and the sector's requirements was also undertaken, and improvements to existing services are planned during the coming year.

## Achievements 2000 — 2001

### The Learning and Skills agenda

Regional activity around the learning and skills agenda has continued apace in the past year, with the introduction of Learning and Skills Councils (LSCs) in April 2001, and the implementation of Yorkshire Forward's Skills Development plan. Initial concerns about the composition of local LSCs and whether the sector's voice would be heard have largely been addressed, and good relations are generally developing between the sector and local LSCs.

### Sector's unique contribution

Learning and skills provision by the sector often focuses on groups which are marginalised as regards training opportunities, and it is important to ensure that the sector's unique contribution is recognised and built upon. This contribution was recognised by Yorkshire Forward, who helped fund the development of consortia in each of the four sub-regions (see below), and LSCs have awarded Local Initiative Funding (LIF) to promote network development.

### Sub-regional consortia

Support for the development of consortia has been a key part of the Forum's work in this area, and two papers were commissioned during the year, to help organisations meet quality standards for LIF: one on the development of sub-regional consortia; the other on the sector's relations with strategic agencies such as Yorkshire Forward and local LSCs.

### Learning Network

The Regional Forum assumed responsibility for the regional Sharing Credit network in March 2001, following

the end of the national Sharing Credit project. Sharing Credit provided a valuable framework for the sectors to respond to the learning and skills agenda for the past two years.

Network meetings have continued around the region, and electronic communication and web-based resources have been established.

### Learning and skills directory

A directory of the sectors learning and skills providers was made available on the Forum website—an outcome from the Leeds conference in June 2000.

### Lifelong Learning

In October 2000, the Forum jointly hosted a regional conference with Ufi in York on sub-regional hubs — part of the Lifelong Learning initiative. The event was attended by some sixty statutory and voluntary and community sector delegates.

### Parents into Learning

The Forum, with the Regional Chamber and Yorkshire Forward, sponsored a study on parents into learning schemes in the region. (See Research section on page 6)

### Future developments

The Forum continues to work with Yorkshire Forward, to address skills development in voluntary sector organisations, in relation to the needs identified in the Regional Economic Strategy and Workforce Development Plan.

## Achievements 2000 — 2001

### Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy

Two further conferences were held on Neighbourhood Renewal during the year: *Funding Neighbourhood Renewal—The Conference*, at the National Museum of Photography, Film and TV, Bradford in November 2000, with the Charities Information Bureau; and a *SEU Regional Consultation*, with the Urban Forum, in March 2001 following publication of the Government's *National Strategy Action Plan*.

The Bradford conference brought together community representatives, voluntary organisations, regeneration managers and funders to discuss the key principles for community involvement in neighbourhood renewal. Speakers included Don Stewart from Yorkshire Forward, Kanchan Jadeja from NACVS, and Steve Skinner from Bradford Council Community Development Policy Unit. Despite residual concerns as to how it will develop, the strategy, along with the government's Urban White Paper, forms the basis for regeneration and social exclusion policy for the foreseeable future, and the *Action Plan* provides the framework for tackling the problems facing deprived communities.

### Community Empowerment Fund and Local Strategic Partnerships

The Community Empowerment Fund (CEF) will help small community groups to fully participate in Local Strategic Partnerships in the nine Neighbourhood Renewal areas in the region. The Forum has provided advice and other expertise to Government Office to help implement the CEF, bringing

together district wide organisations to decide appropriate arrangements for its implementation. The Forum also co-hosted the regional launch event in Leeds in July 2001, and participated in several of the subsequent district launches.

### Improving communication

The Forum web site ([www.yhregforum.org.uk](http://www.yhregforum.org.uk)) continues to provide a gateway for information on Forum activities, events, publications and reports, plus links to other voluntary and community networks, as well as sub-regional organisations, government bodies and other organisations. Several thousand visits are now registered each month. The introduction of the *KnowledgeBase* area allows key documents and briefings to be quickly accessed by members. Further email lists were arranged for the regional Neighbourhood Renewal Group, and for European funding officers and managers, each providing a channel for rapid dissemination of information and discussion. The SharingCredit email list (now the Learning Network) continued to be serviced for learning and skills providers in the region.

### Regional Forum research

#### Mapping the sectors' contribution

The need for data on the voluntary and community sectors' economic, social and environmental contribution to the region led to the Forum producing a broad research programme comprising three strands: quantitative mapping of the sectors' current and potential contribution to the regional economy and the Regional Economic Strategy; qualitative studies to further demonstrate the sectors' contribution; and a third strand around ICT provision and use.

The first output from the programme: *Mapping the Contribution of the Voluntary and Community Sector in Yorkshire and the Humber*, published in May 2001, provides regional estimates of the size and economic contribution of the sector, and provides baseline data previously unavailable.

### Parents into learning

The Forum hosted a 48 week student placement, funded by Yorkshire Forward, with the Regional Chamber and Leeds Metropolitan University, on opportunities for involving parents in learning and skills development in the region. *Parental Learning: an investigation of provision and its impact on the regional learning agenda*, undertaken by Hashim Vali, is important because of the lack of regional co-ordination on the subject and the subject's salience with the government's agenda for improving skill levels and the region's Skills Action Plan.

### *Mapping the Sector's Contribution in Yorkshire and the Humber*

#### Key regional findings

- The number of organisations and groups is between 20,000 and 48,500.
- The number of paid employees is at least 45,000 and maybe as high as 92,000.
- At least 300,000 people engage in volunteering in the region — other estimates suggest a much higher figure.
- The economic contribution of volunteering is huge — at least £48m, and maybe as much as £1.9b.
- The overall economic contribution of the sector is roughly 1- 2.5% of regional GDP or, in money terms, £0.5 -£1.3b.

## Other activities

### Representation on the Regional Chamber

Co-ordinating committee member, Chris Powell, represented the Forum on the Regional Chamber until June 2001, followed by Neil Irving for the remainder of the year. The Forum has continued to be active on several of the Commissions (Skilled and Flexible Workforce; An Advanced Economy; A Robust Infrastructure; Sustainability; and Quality of Life) which work under the auspices of the Chamber, as described in *Advancing Together: Towards a Spatial Strategy*.

### Black and minority ethnic network

The Regional Forum has continued to aid the development of an effective and properly resourced regional black and minority ethnic network. Two staff members were appointed: Tessa Archibald, regional development worker, and Christine Braithwaite, admin. support worker, based at the CEMVO office in Leeds. The Regional Forum is acting temporarily as Accountable Body for Home Office funding.

### Supporting other networks

The Forum continued its support for various other national and regional strategic networks, including the Regional Voluntary Sector Network Forum, the Urban Forum, the regional NCVCCO network, the Voluntary Arts Network, and the regional Environment Network.

### Delivering services in prisons and the probation service

The Forum continued to work with Government Office on voluntary and community sector service delivery to the prison and probation services. The high-

light was a joint conference in November 2000 with Government Office on Developing service delivery in the prison and probation services. Held in Wakefield, the conference was attended by some 100 delegates from the police and probation services and voluntary and community groups, providing a range of information and discussion on current provision, the potential for future development, current national policies, and developing networks and good practice. Collaboration has now progressed to the level of jointly developing a regional resettlement strategy.

### Regional briefing with NCVO

The Forum extended its work with other sector organisations by jointly hosting a regional briefing with the National Council for Voluntary Organisations in York in July 2001—the first in a series of events around the country. The event included presentations on the future of the sector, trustee development, and post-election developments.

### Regional Forum & ICT strategy

The Forum participated in several key ICT policy arenas, both national and regional. The Forum has a seat on the region's ICT Learning Strategy steering group, tasked with raising ICT skill levels of 2 million people in the region. Neil Irving joined the newly created E-Region Forum in August 2001—comprising a range of stakeholders committed to promoting electronic business in the region. The Forum is also participating in a Home Office funded national study on sharing ICT resources across the eighteen generalist and BME regional networks.

## Treasurer's report 2000—2001

### Audited Accounts — April 2000 to March 2001

The Forum has spent this year consolidating its activity and additionally taken on accountability for two new projects; the European Funding Services and the Black & Ethnic Minority Network.

Funding was from four main sources;

- National Lottery Charities Board grant of £127,959 for general staffing and running costs and £15,650 for capital purchases.
- Home Office restricted grants of £56,500 for our generalist work, £13,922 for the BME Network and £20,000 for capital purchases.
- European Grants of £8,099 and a further £21,002 for our partner organisations
- Membership fees, conference fees and other unrestricted income, £17,013.

The organisation expended a total of £206,275 in this period in the course of its work; 65% of this being in direct charitable expenditure, mainly information dissemination and conference organisation. The remaining 35% was spent on the management and administration supporting this work.

At the end of the financial year in question our balance sheet appears healthy, with a Bank balance of £96,908 and fixed assets of £21,915. The organisation also had other assets of £32,333; predominantly unpaid European Grants due, and a quarterly prepayment of rent. Total current assets amounted to £129,241

The accounts also show liabilities of £59,502 at the end of the year; consist-

ing of £16,156 in outstanding bills since paid up, £21,002 European Grants owed to our partners awaiting the income to cover them, and a notional £22,344 of deferred capital grants to cover the depreciation of fixed assets.

The Forum has a prudent policy to generate an unrestricted reserve to cover contingent liabilities and ensure the charity has sufficient resources to cover core funding requirements for a period of 4 months. This reserve totalled £24,402 at the year end.

There were also accumulated restricted funds which amount to £67,252. The majority of this money is required to match long-term liabilities of three-year employment contracts and a three-year lease on the premises after the end of the funding periods. These funds collectively total £91,654.

### Trustees Statement

The financial summaries in this Report are consistent with the full financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2001. The full annual accounts were prepared in accordance with Statement of Recommended Practice, approved on 19 September 2001 and received an unqualified audit opinion.

The summarised accounts may not contain sufficient information to allow for a full understanding of the financial affairs of the Charity. For further information, the Annual Accounts, the Auditor's report on those accounts and the Trustees' Annual Report should be consulted.
